Course Description

Focusing on key terms and approaches in the humanities, this course analyzes some of the cultural processes and products that shape social life, institutions, discourses, and identities in Latin@/x America and Latin America. We'll study a broad range of texts, including poetry, journalism, photography, painting, and film, paying attention to the conditions of their production. Above all, we'll highlight the ways in which cultural practices and products not only reflect, but generate and contest meaning and power.

Course objectives include (1) introducing LALS majors to salient concepts, approaches, debates, and questions in Latino and Latin American cultural studies; (2) showing them how discourse shapes and is shaped by our readings of cultural processes and products; and (3) drawing attention to Latin American and Latino studies as a discourse.
